Jewry Duty was born from an awareness that Jewish day schools and other Jewish educational organizations are often struggling to find and retain Hebrew and Jewish Studies teachers. Yet, they may not have the avenue to do this. Jewry Duty combines these factors and asks: Can most adult members of a Jewish community contribute 5 days of their calendar year to contribute to the Jewish education of the next generation of their community? Can this become a communal expectation as a form of Jewish service and imperative? Jewry Duty presents and troubleshoots one practical, holistic, cyclical, ambitious model to make this concept a viable, sustainable reality. Come and hear how!
